




Part-time faculty in particular often experience

## Often no office; few course May have multiple jobs; often resources; limited support no pay for work outside class

What does all of this mean for students?

Non-tenure track faculty are often very committed to their students, but do not receive support to maximize their

utility in instruction and are limited in their ability to have meaningful interactions with colleagues and students

Inaccessibility+ less interaction with students

Fewer transfers from 2 to 4 year colleges Diminished graduation and retention rates Lower GPAs and fewer attempted hours

Students feel the effects of policies that do not support a majority of the faculty
